
The Task Ahead

- Expand youth programs to include cultural enrichment.

Finally, we must utilize the potential power of the boycott in responding to police killings and brutality and other social injustices.

In Your Opinion, What Is the Number One Problem Facing Black People Today?

The number one issue facing Black America is poverty. It's hard to build on brokenness. This brokenness is deeply embedded within our families, education, communities and every aspect of health, including mental health. A stable foundation is very important on which we build the structure. The effects of poverty flows into our education by crowded classrooms, lack of up-to-

date technology, teacher burnout, and under/ unqualified teachers.

In our communities, economic consequences result in segregation, homelessness, subpar housing, inadequate childcare, and unsafe neighborhoods. This manifestation happens due to limited basic services, social discrimination and exclusions. And let's not forget lack of participation in the decision making. Poverty and unstable family structure are the challenges that are very serious disadvantage for the family and children involved.

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
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From Kingdoms to Kingdoms to Come | Deacon J.B. Bond



would like for us to take a look at our contributions to the world from the standpoint of Black men and women in America. Grammys Once Again Set to Award Artist That Use The Derogatory Term – Ni**Er(A) | Kwabena Rasuli

NBA & Southwest Airlines All Appear to Be O.K. with use of Ni**er(a)

The 65th annual Grammy Award set to take place on February 5, 2023, is once again primed to demean, degrade, dehumanize, and even call for the shooting and killing of Afrikan People in the songs and artists that they have nominated for esteemed awards this year. The majority of artist nominated in the Hip-hop/Rap ern-day minstrels without blackface paint, calling ourselves and each other ni**er, debasing our womenfolk and encouraging fratricide amongst the masses of our People in large and small cities throughout modern-day babylon.

In previous years, the National Congress of Black Women, Hood Research of Detroit and the Committee to Eliminate Media Offensive to Afrikan People (CEMOTAP) all wrote letters to Recording Academy Chief Executive Harvey Mason Jr. expressing concern due to the nomination of several songs that promote decadent and immoral



genre use the offensive, dehumanizing and dangerous racial epithet Ni**er(a) in their songs.

Over 100 years ago when HW Griffin's motion picture "Birth of A Nation" was released, then embarking on a minstrel road show throughout the U.S., the Afrikan masses were terrorized by the spike in support and increased membership of Klu Klux Klan. This increase in support and new recruits for the terrorist group was encouraged by the messages and immoral behavior depicted of our People in the film. We can imagine that our ancestors are spinning in their graves as they look out a hundred years later viewing the immoral and despicable manner of which their great-great grandchildren are being depicted by this evil and dangerous music industry. With notoriety & fiat currency, the music industry is directing confused Afrikans to behave as modbehavior from artist like Da Baby.

In a Blackstarnew.com article penned in 2021 by CEMOTAP's Dr. James McIntosh he asked:

Can you imagine a triple-Grammy nominated record this year—or any year—containing the following lyrics, seemingly encouraging the shooting of Jews—spelling it Joos?

"Cause the codeine had a young joo a swervin" I got the mop, watch me wash 'em like detergent And I'm ballin', that's why it's diamonds on my jersey Slide on opps' side and flip the block back, yeah, yeah Myjuniorpoppedhimandlefthimlopsided, yeah, yeah..."

It would never happen. The same lyrics, however, with the word "N**ers" or "Ni**ahs" inserted, are considered perfectly acceptable. The record, Rockstar, by DaBaby featuring Roddy Ricch has been nominated for three Grammy awards for 2021. Obviously the Recording Academy ignored these letters.

DaBaby is an interesting case. In the summer of 2021 at the annual violent and pornographic Hip-hop minstrel fest known as Rolling Loud in Miami, Florida, DaBaby was recorded live between songs commenting on lewd behavior of homosexuals in the concert venue parking area and said something ignorant about HIV/Aids! During this same set at the minstrel fest, DaBaby had been rapping lyrics about running up on ni**er(a)s squeezing and paying people 20K to kill their own 'potnas, and bragging about his daughter witnessing him kill ni**er(a)s. This set

▲ Greenville, Mississippi held a powerful forum in Galveston, TX focusing on the need for an Independent Black Political Party. In attendance were a number of outspoken grassroots leaders who made dynamic and passionate presentations addressing this ever so important issue. The program opened with a heartfelt welcome from Tarsha Parker, the Co-chair of the Greenville LOC. The master MC was Kareem Muhammad who brought together the distinguished panel.

The panelists included Prince Nagee Muhammad, Prime Minister of the New Turnipseed, a Professor at Jackson State University, Zaki Baruti, President/General of the UAPO, Connie Johnson, a former 2020 candidate for Governor of Oklahoma, Attorney Pamela Muhammad of Houston, TX, and Minister Abdul Haleem Muhammad, the Southwest Regional Minister of the Nation of Islam.

The Greenville LOC outlined their demands to the audience and they included the following points (1) a separate state or territory for Black people (2) reparations and Restoration for Black people (3) equal justice for all regardless of class, creed or color (4) immediate attacks against Black and Latino communities and (5) the immediate restructuring of the criminal justice system.

Finally, as an extension of the conference, the Greenville LOC made a commitment to organize in 2023 a Freedom Summer Project in Mississippi with the purpose being to create a strong Black Independent Party to be known as the "Justice or Else Party." The goal of the party will be to have an agenda that speaks to the real needs of the citizens of Mississippi. A special thanks to UAPO treasurer Queen Ziah who also attended the forum.

- The Measure of a Man (1959)
- Strength to Love (1963)
- Why We Can't Wait (1964)
- Where Do We Go From Here: Chaos or Community (1964)

Below are 13 Powerful King Quotes:

66 The ultimate measure of a man is not where he stands in moments of comfort and convenience but where he stands in times of challenges and controversy" (1963)

66 The time is always right to do what is right" (1955)

66 Injustice everywhere is a threat to justice everywhere" (1963)

66 Our lives begin to end the day we become silent about things that matter" (1965)

66 The function of education is to teach one to think intensively and to think critically. Intelligence produces character ... that is the true goal of education." (1947)

66 Oppressed people cannot remain oppressed forever. The yearning for freedom eventually manifests itself." (1963)

66 The evils of capitalism are as real as the evils of militarism and racism" (1967)

66 The time has come for an all-out war against poverty. The rich nations must use their vast resources of wealth to develop the underdeveloped, school the unschooled and feed the unfed. Ultimately a great nation is a compassionate nation." (1964)

When you ask that question, you begin to question the capitalist economy. And I'm simply saying more and more, we've got to begin to ask questions about the whole society." (1967)



On November 29th the State of Missouri executed 37 year old Kevin Johnson even though there was clear evidence in the racial bias of the former St. Louis County Prosecutor Bob Mccullock, who during the July 5 2005 trial of Kevin

advocated for the death penalty. Kevin who was 19 at the time was accused of shooting and killing Kirkwood MO police officer William McEntee. The shooting was the result of Kevin being extremely upset that his 12-year-old brother's death was the result of Kirkwood police officers raid on his home earlier that morning. The racial bias of the prosecutor was evident, because during his twenty-eight years in office, Mccullock tried five cases dealing with the killings of police officers. Four of the defendants were Black and they each were sentenced to death and the one white defendant received life.

Although Kevin eventually took responsibility for the killing, during his years of incarceration he transformed himself into a positive role model for fellow inmates, family and community. His family, attorney's and the progressive community led by Missourians for Alternative to the Death penalty pushed for clemency. However, their appeal fell on the deaf ears of Missouri Governor Mike Parsons.

The celebration of his life was packed with friends and love ones. The repast was powerful with many in attendance committing themselves to become involved in the movement to address the social ills of this society. Finally, the UAPO through its internet TV Program "Conversation with Zaki Baruti" featured ML Smith who is a major organizer for Missourians for Alternatives to the Death Penalty and Kevin's spiritual advisor, Rev. Darryl Gray.

also featured Tory (bad bob) Lanez, the accused feet shooter of Megan [we refuse to refer to her as a stallion (male horse)] Pete Lanez allegedly had Megan Pete "bleeding on the block." "Bleeding the Block" typically means that one has done a drive-by, spraying or spinning the block with bullets of which some have hit people thus resulting in blood being spilled out on the street. Ironically the lyric "Bleeding the Block" is included in another recent Grammy awarded song from Megan Pete and Beyoncé "Savage"! Black women calling themselves Savages in song and it receives rewards from the damned Grammy's!

Today, DaBaby is basically cancelled due to those statement that were recorded at the Rolling Loud Minstrel fest as he is rarely heard on any radio station and struggles to hold concerts after getting caught disrespecting the LBQGT community. His lyrics about taking the lives of ni**er(a)s were o.k. though and did not warrant sanction.

This year's Grammys set to air in February (Black History Month) of 2023 appears to be continuing their assault on the Afrikan Masses in the United States as they sink lower into violent debauchery with the nomination of F**k Ni**er(a) Free from GloRilla:

Here are some of the lyrics to FNF:



"Bi*ch I'm f**k ni**a free, broke ni**a free – ni**er play with your d**k not me. On gang

We hopping out in red lights, twerking on them headlights, ...Bragging on the that ni**er top (head/oral sex), you better hold his head tight.

Using my name for clickbait, eat my a** and my cl*t, ..."

What does this nomination say to our daughters? Is Harvey Mason Jr. and his team at the Grammys even reading lyrics? Where is our outrage?

Included also in the songs nominated for a Grammy this year is "Pushing P!" Two of the three artist on this song were indicted early in 2022 on RICO Charges, (Yung Slug(thug) and Gunna (recently released). The other artist on this Grammy recognized song is (no) Future. PEACE..." Keep in mind that this song came out early in 2022 not long after the homicide numbers in the U.S. in 2021 was reported to be over 20,000 (a U.S. record) with nearly 60% of the victims being Afrikans born in the U.S. Around 13% of the population being nearly 60% of the homicide victims and not only did they even make a song with lyrics bragging about not wanting peace, but Saturday Night Live features the song on their show and now the Grammys have nominate it for an award. The pervasiveness of the practice of promoting violent and offensive mainstream Hip-Hop/Rap music by this evil entertainment industry continues to be a dangerous influence on our children and youth. From Major sports leagues like the NFL and NBA to major corporations like Southwest Airlines, Afrikan People are the only People en masse constantly demeaned and dehumanized.

During a recent Southwest Flight we decided to take advantage of the free in-flight entertainment available on their wifi. The free selections included movies, several national television stations and a variety of music. One of the music genre choices is Rap/Hip-Hop. The choices of artist included Drake, Niki Minaj, Future, Kodak Black, Beyonce, Rihanna & 21 Savage. The word ni**er is heard constantly unedited during these Southwest Airlines flights, along with lyrics about spinning (shooting up blocks), pornography and drug usage.

We are demanding that Southwest Airlines immediately remove all songs from the Hip-Hop/ Rap genre with lyrics that are offensive and dangerous, including songs that use ni**er(a), promote drug usage and peddling and call for the shooting and killing of people.

In addition, we find it very contradictory for the National Basketball Association early in the season to condemn Kyrie Irving for sharing a video documentary with content that some deem offensive, dangerous and antisemitic, yet they currently allow players to drop n-bombs during the games and telecast with no sanction. They even promote and highlight artist and their songs that use ni**er(a), disrespect our sistas and call for the shooting and killing of Black People at their games and events.

Kyrie was suspended for what turned out the be at least seven (7) games and made to adhere to six (6) criteria in order to get back on the NBA basketball court.

The following are five (5) criteria necessary for the NBA to immediately end the dangerous, offensive and hateful content that they currently promote and highlight:

1. Immediately ban all songs and artist from participating in official NBA events who record

- 2. Apologize immediately for allowing the above practice to persist at NBA games, arenas, events and broadcast for well over a decade.
- 3. All Owners, Administrators, Coaches and Staff must meet with Afrikan-Centered Scholars - the likes of Dr. Carr, Horne, Professors' Amen Rahh, Smalls, Marimba Ani, etc. to undergo sensitivity training, plus attend sessions with the likes of Carl Mack and others who specialize in the history & dangers calling oneself a Ni**er(a).
- 4. Donations of \$2.5 Million from each team to organizations that promote anti-hate and peace initiatives in communities that are currently struggling with the fratricidal violence that has been on-going in cities throughout the U.S.
- 5. Administer Technical Fouls to any player who says ni**er(a) in games immediately. Beginning January 1, 2023 anyone using the word will be hit with a double technical and ejected/ disqualified from the contest. (semi-grace period allowed for de-programming)

We are calling for elected officials and community leaders to condemn the mainstream degradation of Afrikan People by the U.S. entertainment industry in general and condemn these types of lyrics, applying pressure to the Recording Academy to refrain from rewarding artist who record n-word laced, misogynistic "death music" in particular. We also encourage people to call or write the Grammys to protest these practices!

Monday, December 12, 2022 St. Louis, MO (Free) LaMarr Johnson Evidentiary Case/Trial

The Universal African Peoples Organization (UAPO) along with other progressive organizations and faith leaders stood in support of the organizers of the Free LaMarr Johnson campaign press conference held in front of the Carnahan Courthouse. LaMarr Johnson was convicted and sentenced to life for a murder he has steadfastly maintained his innocence. Throughout the week there was an evidentiary

hearing held in Judge David Mason courtroom to determine whether or not there was enough evidence to vacate his sentence and allow him to be a free man after serving 28 years in prison. His case was brought forth through the office of the fiery and progressive Black Circuit Attorney, Kim Gardner. Her office had discovered evidence that the white Circuit Attorney at that time had concealed evidence from LaMarr Johnson

defense team in his original trial held in 1996.

This movement to free LaMarr Johnson has been led by Ms. ML Smith. The decision by the Black judge will be made in several weeks. 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
